"Sing to the Lord a new song! Sing to the Lord, all the earth!" Psalm 96:1 (CEB)

Dear Members and Friends of Central UMC,

What do Charles Wesley, Duke Ellington, and a French monastery have in common? They're all teaching us how to sing our faith this summer!

Last month we kicked off our summer worship series "Singing Our Faith" by exploring our Methodist theological heritage through the hymns of Charles Wesley, what jazz improvisation can teach us about prayer, and the deep spiritual heritage of Bluegrass music. Some of these songs have been very familiar to me, and some were brand new! I had no idea that our United Methodist Hymnal has a hymn composed by the jazz great, Duke Ellington, until Greg Capaldini shared that with me during a planning meeting for this series. Thankfully we were able to hear Greg sing "Come Sunday" UMH #728 for us on June 22.

The scripture above from Psalm 96 reminds us that singing new songs is not an optional extra, but it an expectation for us as people of faith! The psalmist's call to "sing a new song" isn't just poetic language but is an invitation to keep growing and letting music surprise us with fresh ways to connect with God. When we all join the heavenly chorus I'm sure there will be lots of new music for us to learn as we spend our days singing God's praise for eternity.

This month we'll continue singing some familiar songs like many generations has each summer as they gather around a campfire at summer camp, and we'll sing some music that may be new to you as we sing music from the Taizé Community in France.

Whether you're joining us in person (we'd love to hear your voice in the mix!) or connecting virtually from wherever summer takes you, come ready to be surprised by how God meets us in melody. (We've got all the links on how to find us online on the back page of this newsletter.)

JJ CUMC MUSIC RETROSPECTIVE JJ A LOOK AT OUR FAVORITE SONGS

(Inspired by Spotify's "Wrapped," which gives users a personalized summary of their listening habits, this is a look back at the music that has filled our sanctuary.)

We've taken a dive into our music records to see what we've been singing and playing at Central UMC! This summary offers a glimpse into the songs and musical pieces that have been part of our worship services. Please note that the timeframes for different types of music vary based on our record-keeping.

--- Overall Snapshot ---

- Anthem, Introit, and other service music data from: September 12, 1999, to December 29, 2024
- Hymn data from: January 1, 2021, to December 29, 2024
- Total pieces logged across these periods: 2946
- Total unique pieces played: Approximately 619

It's important to remember that for hymns, the counts reflect performance since January 2021. For other service music like anthems and introits, the data generally goes back much further.

MEMBER SPOTLIGHT

My name is Dave Van Patten, and I've been part of the Methodist Church my whole life. I was born in 1944, and my family already had deep roots in the Methodist tradition here in Northern Virginia. My parents began attending the United Methodist Church in the early 1930s, and I became a member of Central in 1956, when I was about 12 years old.

Our family has a long history with the United Methodist Church in this region. On my father's side, they helped start Great Falls United Methodist Church—back when it was still called Forestville. On my grandmother's side, they helped found the Andrew Chapel United Methodist over on Route 7. So, you could say Methodism is in my blood.

I've called Central home ever since I started attending. I served as a trustee here for 12 years, from around 1996 to 2010. I sang in the children's choir when I was young, and later in the adult choir, where I still sing today. I've also played the saxophone here on occasion. I've been playing since I was nine years old, performing with various bands and charitable organizations. It's always been a joy to bring music into this space.

My wife, Tish, served as the church secretary for 21 years. She was a steady and beloved presence in our congregation. She passed away on February 15, and it's still hard to believe she's gone. We were married for 59 years. We got married young—Tish was 18 and I was 21. Back then, if you were under 21, you needed your parents' permission to marry. Her mother didn't want to give us permission, so we went to Rockville, Maryland, and got married there in a Methodist parsonage. People said it wouldn't last—but it did. And it would have lasted even longer if she hadn't passed away.

One of my favorite memories of the old church building is the windows—the way they were set in, the light they let in. It had such character. Of course, we've been through big changes since then, including moving buildings, but those early images stay with me.

Over the years, many people and organizations have helped Central thrive. The HITT Corporation supported us financially in big ways. Dal Foster, who had his own construction company in Merrifield, also helped us out a great deal. We've had so many strong, devoted members here—people who were always good to me and good to this church.

This place has been my whole life. Through good times and hard ones, it's always been a foundation for me. When Tish passed, her memorial service at Central was packed—standing room only, with people out the door. She had also worked for the county police department for 21 years, and the current police chief, along with many other officers, came to honor her. That just shows how much she was loved—not only here, but throughout the community.

Even today, through all the changes and challenges, Central still feels like home. It's a place of faith, music, service, and love—and I'm so grateful to still be here.

Under the guidance of Dr. Kelly Delaney, PhD, RN, these nursing students have brought more than just their clinical skills to our Thursday gatherings—they've brought compassion, professionalism, and genuine care for our community.

The numbers tell part of the story: vital sign checks, basic health assessments, and screenings that our guests might not otherwise receive.
