On September 2, our congregation will celebrate a momentous milestone: the first day of school for Kinhaven in our new building! This final piece of our building project completes our long-held dream becoming reality.

In 2017, Kinhaven temporarily relocated while we worked on transforming our property. Their director spent countless hours meeting with our Building Committee to intentionally design spaces where Kinhaven could serve more children, including those as young as six months old. This space represents our community's commitment to supporting a safe, nurturing place where young children can grow into the incredible humans God created them to be.

Last month, I celebrated my own "first day of school" moment! On August 11, I began a Doctor of Ministry program at Boston University School of Theology. Much has changed since my first day of seminary over twenty years ago: many beloved faculty and staff have retired or passed away, many campus buildings are new or in the process of being remodeled, and the use of technology is significantly different! My fall class will be entirely online. Yet the school's core values, academic rigor, and students committed to transforming the world through their unique ministry settings remain unchanged.

Similarly, Central has undergone a tremendous transformation this past decade: our building looks different, some beloved community pillars have moved away or joined the great cloud of witnesses, and our technology has evolved. But what hasn't changed is our commitment to Worship God, Serve Others, and Embrace All.

As guests join us for worship, we have the joy of sharing God's faithfulness and inviting them into our unfolding story. Our new worship series, "A Story Worth Sharing" begins September 7. Whether you've been part of Central for years or are just discovering us, this series will remind you that your story matters and that God is still writing the next chapter. KINHAVEN'S FIRST DAY AT CUMC: WHAT TO EXPECT WITH DROP-OFF & PICK-UP

We're so excited that Kinhaven can officially start school at CUMC next week!

Their transportation plan relies primarily on the drop-off and pick-up spots along the driveway on the ground floor, so CUMC folks should utilize the garage spaces to keep those drop-off and pick-up spots clear.

Some Kinhaven parents will use the garage so they can fob up to the second floor using the elevator, but most will be entering and exiting through the gates on the first floor playground.

MEMBER SPOTLIGHT: SHARON LOVERING

I am a native Arlingtonian, old enough to have "Arlington Hospital" on my birth certificate. I was raised in Wilson Boulevard Christian Church, where I attended Sunday school with some terrific teachers: Margaret Fisher, Carol King, Jay Jarvis (who taught me some basic photography and darkroom skills), and Zara Shepard.

Mrs. Shepard's husband was occasionally called upon to assist with preparing items for her class. The most memorable for me was the hand-crafted Advent wreaths. They were made of wood, with holes for the candles; we went out and gathered evergreen and holly branches from the trees that grew around the church.

When we came back inside, we nailed them on with small nails and a hammer. On one attempt to tack down the holly branch, I ended up hammering my thumbnail instead. Ouch!

I spent many years in Girl Scouts, from Brownies and Juniors all the way up to Seniors. My Gold Award project was writing a book of games and activities for Daisy Girl Scouts. As far as I know, it's still available today. I got some of my craft ideas for Sunday school from my experiences in scouting.

In 2007, when I decided to leave the church I grew up in, I began to look around for a new church home. I dropped in here at Central several times. I had come to Saturday Night Alive in the '90s, and thoroughly enjoyed it. I checked out several different churches. One of my friends from martial arts class invited me to his church.

When it came time for communion, I wasn't sure whether I should partake. Mother Linda Harrison and Father Stan Dubowski made it clear that I was welcome to take communion. So I did – and was shocked to find wine, not grape juice, in the communion glass!

I also checked out Christ Church Arlington, which in my childhood was known as Pershing Drive Christian Church. I was surprised to run into one of the guys who played drums in the W-L band playing there in the praise band – and even more surprised that he remembered me. I liked it there, but it didn't feel quite right.

So I came back to Central. I liked the people, I loved the choir, and the variety of activities that happened at church. Chocolate Sunday and Pi Day were among my favorites. I began working in the Sunday school program sometime in 2008.

While we were sharing space with First Vietnamese-American UMC, I agreed to combine our Sunday school class with their elementary class. It took a while for the kids to get comfortable with me. I'd bring in snacks and cold drinks, and crafts that nobody had ever done with them.

Eventually they begged me to tell them what we would do the following week! So I'd give them a sneak preview of what the Bible lesson would be about, and how messy the craft would be. On our last Sunday, that same young lady told me, "Miss Sharon, I love you." And many of the others came for one last hug.

God works in mysterious ways. I'm glad he worked his magic through me to reach one of the toughest groups of Sunday school kids I've ever worked with.

CROP WALK | OCTOBER 18, 9:00 AM

Mark your calendar for the 48th annual Arlington CROP Hunger Walk on Saturday, October 18. The walk covers 3–6 miles through Arlington and is part of a nationwide effort organized by Church World Service (CWS) to fight hunger both locally and globally.

This year is especially critical. Until recently, more than 88% of CWS's funding came from federal sources. Because of major federal cuts to food aid programs and refugee support, CWS has been forced to reduce services, lay off staff, and in some cases close offices. Locally, the Arlington Food Assistance Center is also facing a serious budget shortfall due to increased demand.

CROP Hunger Walks cannot make up all the difference, but they remain a major source of support. We walk to help hungry people — and sadly, we walk because our leaders have cut off food for starving children. A percentage of funds raised will stay right here in Arlington to help our neighbors.

Steve Barham, who has faithfully participated for many years, will be walking again this year. If you would like to support this effort, you can:




BRING WORSHIP HOME: THE UNITED METHODIST HYMNAL, HOME EDITION

The Leadership Board met on August 10, 2025. Kinhaven will start school on September 2, 2025, Praise God! We're exploring our options for a staff position to include maintenance oversight. Bella Voce singing group will perform a Christmas concert on December 13 at 4:00 PM with donation supporting our community cafe.

The board finished revising and unanimously approved an updated "Safe Sanctuary policy." We will need to schedule a training for all staff and all volunteers who work with children to make sure everyone is updated on this policy.

The board reviewed and approved signing a Preventive Maintenance Contract for our kitchen appliances. The Investment Committee and the Parsonage Committee will meet in September.
